6.	Report from summer ad hoc group and discussion of Interdisciplinary Arts Certificate across and			
	within schools and colleges			
	a.	This ad hoc group looked at currently existing arts certificates and discussed recommendations		
		for new certificates.		
	b.	An Interdisciplinary Arts Certificate would allow students from across campus, regardless of their		
		major or degree program, to engage in a meaningful, rigorous coursework in and across the Arts		
		<u>Departments</u> . This program of interdisciplinary study would engage students in the arts to offer		
		greater understanding of the world, express and challenge points of view, break down barriers		
		and silos, explore and address injustices, and advance intellectual artistic diversity.		



- c. Interdisciplinary Arts Certificates should include a capstone course. Group suggests that the IARP courses serve as an excellent capstone course for these certificate programs.
- d. Recommendation is to investigate and respond to campus-wide push for Interdisciplinary Arts Certificates, including:
 - i. STEAM
 - ii. Arts & Wellness
 - iii. Arts & Social Justice
 - iv. Arts Entrepreneurship (with internship program); collaboration with Bolz Arts Admin.
 - v. Interdisciplinary Performance
 - vi. Interdisciplinary Arts
- e. The above categories are already important topics on campus and these certificates could tap into these already existing courses.
- f. Suggestion to look at the courses students are currently taking, students are already creating their own certificate curriculum independently. Adding a capstone will tie these courses together.
- g. Certificates allow students in other majors to participate more fully in the arts, more than at the introductory level.
- h. SoHE and SoE have run into capacity issues with some certificates. Studio courses have great interest but limited space.
- i. As a non-curricular unit, the Division cannot house certificates, these will need to be housed in the academic departments. The Division will explore the issue of the administrative labor needed.

7. Revisit the structure of the year-long Interdisciplinary Arts Residency Program (introduction of topic for discussion at October meeting)

a. Chris has introduced the topic of revisiting the structure of the year-long Interdisciplinary Arts Residency Program in order to accommodate two semester-long courses during one year-long residency. One benefit of this structure would be the opportunity for continued for-credit curricular engagement throughout the academic year. In order to prepare for topic discussion, the Committee is asked to revisit the <u>proposal</u> accepted in fall 2020 to gauge reactions and benefits among their respective departments on the proposed change, and to come to the October meeting prepared to have a conversation on this proposal. Committee members to revisit proposal accepted in fall 2020 in preparation for discussion at October meeting.

- b. Arts Residency Programs Update Interdisciplinary Arts Residency Programs
 - i. Rafael Casal's year-long residency will not happen as planned. We are pivoting to a series of short-term residencies in partnership with residency lead Sofía Snow (Office of Multicultural Arts Initiatives).
 - ii. Each visiting artist in the series will represent the three pillars of OMAI: academics, arts, and activism. The short-term interdisciplinary arts residencies will secure highly esteemed and established artists to engage in educational/research experiences as well as build bridges with multicultural campus groups, community organizations, and arts departments at UW–Madison.
 - iii. The residency series will begin with collaborators Jay Adana and Zeniba Now, in residence at UW—Madison October 6–16, 2022. The duo will be accompanied by a collective of guest artists, in preparation for a headlining performance of their production, The Loophole, at the 16th Annual Passing the Mic Festival. The residency will also include participation in the first Just Bust! Open Mic + Workshop events of the academic year, open rehearsals, and opportunities for guest lectures and workshops.
